

## CLOSING THE LOOP: FOOD WASTE IN ATLANTA

Food Well Alliance collaborates with local food movement leaders to support healthy soil practices and divert food waste. The increased production of compost allows our city's urban growers to build healthier communities through sustainably-grown, locally produced food.

This year, we brought together a diverse group of public, private and nonprofit leaders for the Community-Based Compost Working Table who identified challenges and opportunities to increase community-based composting in Metro Atlanta. This coalition of compost experts, educators, regulators and urban growers also collectively developed 9 strategic recommendations to reuse food waste to increase community-based composting capacity for urban farmers and community gardens in Metro Atlanta.
